I am also deeply indebted and touched by the hospitality and support that all of you have given me over the past 7 years, it has been a real privilege and pleasure to have met so many of you and to have enjoyed your company. 
number of Life Members on the database is currently 22,350, although not all have provided us with their current contact details.

BRANCH ACTIVITIES




Middlesex Yeomanry. The Middlesex Yeomanry Association goes from strength to strength – we now have 200 members, mainly thanks to our tenacious Membership Secretary, David Lambert. Work on developing a complete and accurate historical record of the Regiment's activities during World War 2 has continued, and the discovery that a signal section from the Regiment had been attached to 5 Regiment RHA in 1940 was the stimulus for a visit in June by members of the Association to the town of Cassel in French Flanders and the nearby battlefield of Hondeghem. A little later in the year, the Pearson Shoot, the annual shooting competition between the Association and 47 (Middlesex Yeomanry) Signal Squadron took place at Longmoor. For the first time, the competition took the form of a clay pigeon shoot, with guest teams from Surrey ACF and the Worshipful Company of Spectacle Makers. The Association team narrowly prevailed against the Squadron, but the team from the ACF were the best, by some distance. The Middlesex Yeomanry's annual memorial parade and service, Lafone Day, took place at the Guild Church of St Martin within Ludgate and in the crypt of St Paul's on 27 October, precisely 95 years to the day after Major Alexander Lafone and seventeen other Middlesex Yeomen made the ultimate sacrifice at the battle of El Buggar Ridge near Beersheba, Lafone earning a posthumous VC. Afterwards the Association was addressed at its Annual Reunion Dinner by Maj Gen Sir Sebastian Roberts KCVO OBE, who spoke eloquently about Major Lafone and how he exemplified the contribution made by the Territorial Army in war. VISIT TO THE NETHERLANDS, MAY 2012

Len Brace, who served with 11 Air Formation Signals from January 1943 until June 1947 and lives in Ilford, has been on a 5-day trip Arnheim, courtesy of the London Taxi Benevolent Association for War Disabled (LTBAWD).

On 2 May 2012 80 taxis, carrying 160 veterans, boarded the Stenna Line ferry and travelled from Harwich. They arrived at the Papendal Hotel, Arnheim, at 11.00am the following day. In a very busy programme, the following places were visited: the Bronbeek Veterans Home, the Commonwealth War Graves Commission cemetery at Oosterbeek (where wreaths were laid), the Nationaal Bevrijdings Museum at Groesbeek (for a Service of Remembrance), the National Liberation Day Service at Rehen, the Oosterbeek Airborne Museum where a Dutch pipe band was in attendance and in a very moving ceremony local schoolchildren exchanged gifts with the veterans and the Dutch National Liberation Parade held at Wageningen.



On the final evening a formal dinner with Dutch guests and hosts plus entertainment was held . The veterans returned by ferry and ended the trip with a Remembrance Service at the stern of the ship, returning to Harwich after a round trip of 560 miles. SOUDA BAY CEMETARY - CRETE

On 28 October 1940 Italy invaded mainland Greece from Albania. The Italians were initially repulsed, but subsequent German intervention forced the Greek Army and a Commonwealth expeditionary force, sent from Egypt the previous month, to be evacuated by the Royal Navy and to fall back to Crete.

Crete's excellant harbours were a potentially important base of operations for the Royal Navy, from which it could threaten German and Italian shipping in the Mediterranean.

Anxious to crush Greek resistance and to secure her southern flank before commencing offensive operations against Russia, German forces planned the assault of Crete. The continued dominance of the Royal Navy in the Mediterranean prevented a seaborne invasion but on 20 May 1941 the Germans launched a massive airborne attack using paratroopers against the British, Australian, New Zealand and Greek troops defending the island.



Souda Bay Cemetery, which overlooks Souda Bay, has 1500 Commonwealth war graves located there and is maintained in immaculate condition by the The Commonwealth War Graves Commission. On Sunday 11 November at 1100hrs over 500 people attended a Remembrance Service to honour all those fallen soldiers. Wreath layers from all the UK Major Units. New Zealand, South Africa, Australia and Canada. There were representatives from the American Navy, Greek Navy, Greek Air Force and other VIPs. A Corps wreath was placed.

M62 BOMBING MEMORIAL SERVICE

On Sunday 3 February at 1030hrs, a short Service was held at the Memorial Stone in the Hartshead Moor Services area on the Westbound side of the M62. This was to remember the twelve people (nine soldiers, three civilians) who were killed by a bomb, which consisted of 25 pounds of high explosive, hidden in a luggage locker on a coach.

There was a good congregation and four RSA Standards were on Parade; Preston & Blackburn, Oldham, Manchester and Southport. **David Vickers** laid the Wreath on behalf of the Corps.





WELFARE

My prediction last year that 2012 would be a big year was absolutely correct. However, I don't think any of us really imagined that the Olympics would hold our attention as much as they did or that we would get so involved in the pomp and ceremony of the Diamond Jubilee celebrations.

I was lucky enough to be invited to the Royal Garden Party and saw The Duchess of Cambridge on her first outing to a Garden Party. The whole day was blessed with good weather (good going for 2012!) and I was absolutely thrilled to be there. My good fortune didn't end there as I was then invited, along with my family, to the Queens Diamond Jubilee Concert. The event was an amazing experience and earned me copious amounts of bonus points with my two teenage daughters. 2013 will have to work hard to beat its predecessor!

Unfortunately the continuing squeeze on our finances this year will be difficult for many, causing distress and concern. If you are aware of a former or present Signaller and their dependants who are in conditions of need, hardship or distress please remind them of our existence. All



information on eligibility, types of assistance available and contact details can be found on the excellent RSA web-site: www.royalsignalsassociation.co.uk Basically initial contact should be made with SSAFA or the Royal British Legion (RBL) who then in turn will forward an application to RSA Welfare for financial assistance.

We rely heavily on the casework carried out by SSAFA Forces Help and the RBL to provide all the relevant information upon which decisions can be made. If necessary we liaise with the Army Benevolent Fund – The Soldiers Charity, The Officers' Association, the Royal Commonwealth Ex-Services League, Combat Stress, Veterans Agency and many more.

2012 saw an increase of £24k in grants compared to 2011. Our total spend for the year was £396,501.60. All applications are judged on their merits but in all cases the question of *need* is the most significant factor. Timing is a very important factor when dealing with cases of need as we endeavour to deal with applications as quickly as possible. It is amazing how one grant at the right time can really make a difference to the quality of someone's life and their future. Grants are not made to individuals direct but through the sponsoring welfare organisation.

All cases for £600 and below are considered on a daily basis by our Assistant Regimental Secretary; **Maj (Retd) Mark Tivey**. Over the past twelve months the Royal Signals Benevolent Fund (regular and major grants) provided £396,501 of assistance to 745 applicants. These grants have been instrumental in providing 47 electric scooters, 10 stair lifts and 8 level access showers. There are numerous other types of assistance requested such as help with priority bills (rent or utilities), clothing, emergency house repairs etc.

Assistance over £601 up to the maximum of £1,200 are considered at the Major Grants Meetings (MG). The MG meetings take place once a month. Each meeting is attended by me (**Linda**) the Welfare Secretary, a Retired Officer, a serving Field Officer and an NCO. The Retired Officer is selected from a list of nine volunteer Chairmen who kindly give up their time once or twice a year to lead a meeting. The Field Officer is selected from within Headquarters Royal Signals so as there is a limited number to pick on nominate we are often lucky to see the same officer attend more than once during their posting at Blandford Camp. Each attendee has the task of considering the applications and deciding the level of assistance they feel appropriate.

We usually have an average of 12 cases per meeting although it has been known to reach over 20 in busier periods. Our average spend (using the figures from Jan 2012 – Dec 2012) is £11,293 per meeting.




A few examples of how we have made a difference in 2012:

Back in July we received a heart rending application for assistance with the provision of a family holiday for Sig Gavin Plant, his wife Lindsay and their three beautiful children. Riley, the youngest had been diagnosed with brain cancer and the prognosis was dire. He had to endure chemotherapy and the family were fraught with worry. However, they were determined to make his last days as happy as possible, creating joyous memories. A holiday at Primrose Valley in Filey gave the family precious time together. Sadly, Riley passed away shortly afterwards. We received a lovely letter from **Lindsay** which read: "The holiday has given us lasting memories of some of the happiest times we spent with Riley. I would also like to thank you for the support you gave us with the funeral costs. Your generosity has relieved pressures and has given us great comfort in the knowledge that the Corps looks after its families."

In December we received an application to help a severely disabled little chap called **Lewis Preuss**. His mum **Leanne** had previously served with the Signals but gave up her career to become **Lewis's** full-time carer. His Dad **Darren** is still serving. When we received the application poor **Leanne** had just broken her arm badly so the physical problems of caring for a disabled child must have been enormous. We were very pleased to be

able to help with the provision of a special cot, wheelchair and speech therapy for little Lewis. From Leanne: "Firstly let me thank you for the funding you have generously given us. The speech and language therapy will make a massive difference not only to Lewis but to us as a family. Lewis has so much wrong with him that it can be hard for him to express pain and hurt and this way hopefully he will start communicating. We do not know if he will speak but he will, in time, be able to communicate in some way and to us that is priceless. I dream of the day that I will be able to hold a conversation, in any method, with my son and he will be able to understand me when I tell him I love him and that he is my world."



REGIMENTAL SECRETARY'S UPDATE ON THE ROYAL SIGNALS BENEVOLENT FUND

2012 has been a year of significant change for the Royal Signals Benevolent Fund (RSBF) in that, in close consultation with our solicitors, the Corps has made a number of important changes to our charitable structure, the first since 1997 when the RSBF was rebranded under a new Charity Commission scheme. This short article described the main changes to bring you up to date.

Most will be aware that, for most of the Corps' history, the Corps Committee, under the chairmanship of the Master of Signals, has been the main trustee board for the Benevolent Fund. This is no longer the case but the "Royal Signals Corps Council" which has replaced it, still under the chairmanship of the Master, retains the legal right to appoint and remove the directors of a new board of trustees which I shall describe below. The Corps Council is still composed of our Colonels Commandant and former Colonels Commandant in specific roles (such as Chairman RSA) and remains a mixture of serving and retired senior officers in key Regular and TA appointments.



The trustees are now a separate board of directors in a re-structured Royal Signals Trustee Ltd (RSTL), which acts as the corporate trustee for the Benevolent Fund. It is a company limited by shares and 3 of the directors are also shareholders. The directors/trustees are all volunteers and, once again, a mix of serving and retired officers - both regular and TA. The RSTL has taken over the role of the old Finance Committee and the members have full trustee responsibilities. To provide even further "due diligence" the RSTL Board has been joined by professional investment advisors who provide guidance on where and how the Corps invests its funds. There has been no change to the annual Corps calendar of meetings, which remains on exactly the same cycle as before, and there has been no structural change to the RSBF Funds.

In financial terms, the RSBF pretty much broke-even in 2012 but faces deficits in the future given the reduction in the size of the Army and the resulting loss of income through the one day's pay scheme. We don't, though, anticipate a reduction in our expenditure as the serving Corps will have more time for sport and adventurous training etc following the withdrawal from Afghanistan whilst, sadly, the numbers of Signallers in need increases every year. In order to help compensate, donations and legacies will be even more important than ever before and, along with other measures, we are recruiting a Marketing Officer with the specific task of increasing RSBF income with the help of units and the Association. I urge you to help the Marketing Officer, **Major (Retired) Fiona Nelson**, in any way you can.

In summary, RHQ has restructured the RSBF to ensure that the Corps Charity remains compliant with current Charity Commission guidance and to match the changing needs of the Corps in the 21St century. We have continued throughout to provide essential support to our soldiers, dependants and veterans but do face financial challenges in the future. Any help you or your branch can give in fundraising will, therefore, be hugely appreciated. Certa Cito!

AN UPDATE ON THE SERVING CORPS

There has been a significant amount of change for the Corps within my first 12 months of appointment as the Corps Regimental Sergeant Major, and no doubt there will be more to follow as we begin to implement the "Future Force 2020" review. Closest to home our largest noticeable change to the Corps began with the loss of the Signal Officer in Chief (Army) and his "Arms Directorate" headquarters. In place we now have Colonel Royal Signals (Colonel Graham Norton), who, with his small Headquarters "Headquarters Royal Signals" focusses exclusively on our people, whilst the technical and training aspects of business are now the work of an integrated Information Capability Directorate in Army Headquarters. This transformation and the physical move of the Headquarters to Griffin House has involved a huge amount of work by all.



In terms of change yet to come, the Army 2020 structures were announced on 5 July 2012. Overall, the outcome for the Royal Corps of Signals and Queen's Gurkha Signals was positive; no more Regular Regiments were cut, although the loss of one further Reserve Regiment is disappointing following the severe "cull" of 2009. However, whilst there will be a reduction to Regular posts in the Corps we have already made considerable progress towards meeting the required cuts as a result of the earlier Strategic Defence and Security Review exercise (the disbandment of 7 Signal Regiment, for example). While there will inevitably be a need for further redundancies, either to get down to the target numbers or for structural reasons, this will be considerably less painful than would have been the case if the Corps had simply waited for the announcement and then acted. In broad terms our pre-Strategic Defence and Security Review liability was approximately 8480, our current manning is around 7750, and our end-state is forecast to be around 7000.

Operationally, Afghanistan still continues to be our main effort with some 680 soldiers from across the Corps deployed; primarily from 2 Signal Regiment, 14 Signal Regiment (Electronic Warfare) and 204 Signal Squadron. On a daily basis it is humbling to hear of their many great deeds achieved, routinely proving themselves as technically able, robust and highly professional soldiers. Beyond Afghanistan our soldiers also performed exceptionally during the Olympics. As you would expect, the communications support was first class and many members of the Corps were in the public eye as they helped deliver the security for both Main and Paralympic Games. As ever, they did so in style, with professionalism and good humour.

Regimental Headquarters has also made notable changes to the Royal Signals Benevolent Fund, both to match the staff structures we now have and also to ensure that our charity matches current charity and company law. This has been led by our senior trustee, **Major General Ashley Truluck**, ably supported by the Regimental Secretary, **Colonel (Retired) Terry Canham**, who has become our expert in matters legal, financial and commercial! They have both done a huge amount of work in a very short timescale to see this to a successful conclusion. One consequence is that the Corps Committee has mutated to become the "Corps Council" with many of its trustee duties devolving to a corporate trustee board consisting of retired and serving senior officers. The Corps Council does, of course, retain overall control!

As you would expect, this change has not been allowed to impact on Benevolent Fund welfare business and we continue to place a very high priority on helping signallers and former signallers in need. Last year saw a further increase in charitable grants to £396,500 for 745 cases; an increase of over £20,000 from 2011. If you include the Army Benevolent Fund contributions the overall amount spent helping our people was over £480,000. However, with a reducing "one day's pay" income from our serving soldiers as unit numbers reduce, we are also now facing the possibility of a deficit balance for the Benevolent Fund in the future. This year, therefore, Regimental Headquarters is very much focussing on a number of initiatives to increase our income from other sources.

It has, again, been a fantastic year for Corps sport, and barely a week goes by without further success at Army and inter Corps level; the spectacle of two Corps units winning both the major and the minor units Army Cups in football back to back on one wet afternoon in Aldershot will live long in the memory. In a similar vein our people continue to find challenging opportunities for adventurous training and a highlight was the outstanding performance of Team Mercury in the Antarctic.

In conclusion, I suspect that the 2012 drumbeat of change looks set to increase in intensity as plans develop over the coming months. For Army 2020, much work is still to be done not least to identify where our units will be based, but we would hope to minimise any disruption and reorganise as quickly as possible on to our new structures in spite of the many unknowns at this time.

What is clear is that our people remain some of the very best around; we are fortunate to have them, and as long as we do we won't go far wrong!
